2010 Head Start and Early Head Start Accomplishments:

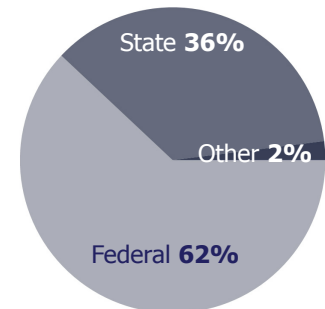
- 973 children were served
- 761 children received developmental screenings
- 249 single parent families were served
- 83 homeless families were served
- 75 children with special needs were served
- 37 prenatal women were served

Of the 973 children enrolled in Head Start/ Early Head Start programs:

- 574 children enrolled based on income eligibility (59%)
- 114 children enrolled based on receiving public assistance (12%)
- 5 children enrolled due to status as a foster child (5%)
- 72 children enrolled whose families had income falling between 100-130% of poverty guidelines (7%)

Parent Involvement Activities

- 6,327 volunteer hours of classroom assistance
- 4,425 volunteer hours of extended learning activities
- 1,149 volunteer hours of Parent committee meetings
- 640 volunteer hours participation in Child Development Policy Council/Regional Parent Committees
- 39 volunteer hours of training provided
- \$87,516 of in-kind donations (services and goods) received

Family Services and Resource Referrals

325 families received family support services to maintain and improve employment, housing, health and education:

- 41 families received services/resources for emergency/crisis intervention
- 189 families received services/resources for housing assistance
- 42 families received mental health services
- 73 families received services/resources for adult education

Health Services

Children receive an array of preventive health care services:

- 910 Head Start/Early Head Start children had health insurance
- 916 children received health screens
- 731 Head Start/Early Head Start children were up-to-date on a schedule of age-appropriate preventive and primary health care
- 709 Head Start/Early Head Start children completed a professional dental exam
- 936 children have a continuous source of health care
- 761 children received developmental screenings

Progress in Meeting Teacher Degree Requirements

53%	Teachers have a Child Development Associates credential or higher
34%	Teachers have an Associates Degree in early childhood or related field
3%	Teachers have a Baccalaureate in early childhood education
3%	Teachers have a Master's degree in early childhood education

Teachers; Teacher Aides; Supervisors; Home Visitors completing college courses toward an early childhood education degree:

- Fall 2009:** 68 credits successfully completed
Spring 2010: 89 credits successfully completed
Summer 2010: 21 credits successfully completed

Upcoming endeavors for meeting teacher degree requirements:

- Fall 2010:** 46 Staff are enrolled in classes totaling 94 credits
Spring 2011: 5 teachers & teacher aides are expected to attend a CDA intensive training
